## Footnotes

1. Was one of the witnesses at the registration of my Great Grandfathers, Edmund Smith's birth on 22/4/1832. Later Census Returns would show that his farm had an area of around $\mathbf{4 0}$ acres.
2. His birth was registered on $\mathbf{2 2} / \mathbf{4} / \mathbf{1 8 3 2}$, on the same day as Edmund Smith.
3. Both Tempest Spencer and Robert Shackleton were slaters by trade.
4. At one point I thought it possible that she was an older sister of Edmund - but this hypothesis was subsequently disproved when Edmund's real family was found.
5. One wonders whether she was the unmarried Mary Smith who had a John Smith Christened at Kildwick Parish Church on $\mathbf{1 7 / 6 / 1 8 0 4}$. At one point in the research this presented the interesting possibility that this lady could have been my Great, Great, Great Grandmother. However, subsequent findings nullified it.
6. This William Smith was the illegitimate son of Ann Smith.
7. As a next-door neighbor to the Fawcetts one wonders how well the publican John Laycock would have got along with them, Baptist Ministers of that period often took a strong stance against the 'demon drink.'
8. Was possibly a brother of my Great, Great Grandmother Ann Wilson. His father may either have been Edward Wilson a few doors down or (as his forename suggested) the son of the William Wilson who by then was living in Colne. There still exists a Wilson Street in this part of Sutton. It is sited just below Salt Pan Farm.
9. Was possibly the brother of Mary McRoben - a witness at the wedding of John Smith and Ann Wilson on 24/5/1824.
10. Was possibly an older brother of Mary Overend who was the second wife of John Smith who in $\mathbf{1 8 3 4}$ was one of the two handloom weavers in Sutton with that name
11. Was another possible brother of Ann Wilson.
12. May have either been an uncle or father of Ann Wilson.
13. One wonders whether John Smith ever worked for James Roe the corn miller as a Millwright. Salt Pan Farm was a large sandstone building that could easily have contained a corn mill. John Smith could have walked to this place in several minutes.
14. Registered on $\mathbf{8} / 7 / \mathbf{1 8 0 4}$, he appears to have been a son of Edward and Isabel Smith who resided in Glasburn.
15. Did he work at Salt Pie Farm? If so, did he take over the job from John Smith during the early 1830s?
16. Was the man I wrongly mistook to be the father of my Great Grandfather, Edmund Smith for much of research. This John Smith died of blood poisoning on $\mathbf{1 7 / 9 / 1 8 6 3}$ whilst being apparently estranged from his family. His style of writing was very neat.
17. Mary Smith was a daughter of Rowland Smith and had been born on $\mathbf{3 1 / 1 2 / 1 8 1 3}$. She was married on $\mathbf{2 2} / \mathbf{1 0} / \mathbf{1 8 3 5}$ and like her then future husband was a witness at the wedding of another John Smith (also a hand loom weaver of Sutton) who married the heavily pregnant Mary Overend on 30/3/1834. At the time of that event Mary Smith was illiterate. For much of this study I wrongly mistook her to be the second wife of my Great, Great Grandfather.
18. Missing presumed deceased were William (who was born on $\mathbf{1 5 / 8} / \mathbf{1 8 3 4}$ ) and Robert (who was born on $\mathbf{8 / 6 / 1 8 3 7}$ ). Repeated attempts to trace their death certificates through three Registry Offices proved unavailing. In contrast to his brothers, Thomas lived on into adulthood. All three were the sons of John and Mary Overend, however no direct relationship with my own forbears was proved.
19. She may have been the widow of Peter Bassit who was born on 29/7/1792 and registered $\mathbf{5 / 1 1 / 1 7 9 2}$. He was the son of Thomas and Martha Bassitt of Sutton.
20. On $9 / 3 / 1803$, Titus Smith had a John Smith christened at Kildwick Parish Church by his then common law wife Sarah Moor. At Sutton Baptist Chapel the birth dates of his daughters Hannah and Charlotte were 9/12/1812 and 3/4/1814 respectively. By then he had evidently married Sarah Moor.
21. Thomas Bairstow was already a substantial Worsted Spinner and manufacturer. He owned Bairstows Mill in Sutton and was a trustee of the mechanics institute at Skipton. He was born in 1808. His brother Matthew (who was born in 1816) lived in neighbouring Eastburn and was a co-owner of the business. Their father was called John Bairstow Senior and it was he who purchased the nearby corn mill in April 1809.

## Comments

This data shows that the weaving district of Sutton Mill consisted mainly of C2 weavers and other skilled workers. Families like the Smiths, Overends and Wilsons were often actual or near next door neighbors to one another. This may explain the high degree of intermarriage between them. In this community everyone would tend to know every one else.
