

Revolutionary War. An army of one-thousand answered the call for assistance by the Crown assembling at New Bern in 1776. There is no evidence that Moses supported either position, for there is no indication of his having sold or otherwise provided food, clothing, shelter or transportation for the British or the Minutemen. But, on March 4, 1775 Moses received a grant from the Crown. Just six weeks after he received 150 acres grant from King George III (1760-1820), April 18, 1775, Redcoats and Minuteman clashed in the first battle of the War of Rebellion in Lexington and Concord, Massachusetts. Six years later in March of 1781 the British decided to give up most of North Carolina. In 1783 the Revolutionary War was ended.

2. Jesse STANLEY

of Lenoir Co NC appears on p. 22 of the 1800 census, p. 298 of the 1810 census, on pp. 17 and 291 of the 1820 census and on p. 512 of the 1830 census for Wayne Co NC. Further examination is necessary to determine whether any of these is the son of Moses. 1820 NC census (M-33-80-291) {same page as Polley Stanley} finds Jesse Stanley with males, 1 16-18, 1 16-26, 2 45 and over, and females 1 16-26 and 2 45 and over, with 5 male slaves, 3 female slaves and one free colored.

3. Moses STANLEY, Jr.

of Lenoir Co NC appears on p. 22 of the 1800 census, again on the 1810 census in Duplin Co p. 656. (M-252-40-656) He may have married Sally WEST in Duplin Co. It is recorded that he sold land which earlier was part of the Moses Stanley tract in Duplin Co, NC in 1818. Moses Stanly (Jr), 400102/001002. This means males, 4 under 10, and one 26-45, and 2 ????. Females one 16-26 and ????. No 1820 census listing is found for Moses, Jr.

4. William STANLEY

of Duplin Co NC appears in 1790 Dobbs of the New Bern Dist. p. 137 with 1-3-1, head of family 16 & up, 3 males under 16 and one female. A "Will" Stanley, probably William in 1810 Duplin is on p. 683.

5. MAJOR HENRY STANLEY

of Wayne Co, NC b. 1784-1790, d. Stewart Co, GA ca 1843. Major appears census of 1810 Wayne Co roll 43 p. 835. (00100/00100/0/0). Both Major and his first wife (Mary _____?) were between the ages of 16 and 26, (born 1784-1794.) In the census of 1820 Wayne Co p.482, (00001/01010-2), translates into one girl between 10 & 16, most likely ten as there were no children in the last census, and Major and wife both between 26 and

45. (born between 1775 & 1794.) Since ten years earlier their births were bracketed between 1784 and 1794 we may discard the 1775 date as incorrect.

All children of Major Henry Stanley, and wife Mary _____ were born in Wayne Co., NC except their last child, a daughter named Martha Keziah, who was born in Georgia. This supports the recollections of son Major Henry Stanley who recalls moving to Georgia when he was about four years of age. Their children were:

Major was appointed guardian for ~~John Ivey~~, a minor in November 1820 (Wayne Co. MD 0-1 70.837) ~~John, presumably under the age of 18, was the son of Robert Ivey~~, a neighboring farmer who might have died shortly before the guardianship papers were prepared and executed.

January 16, 1826 Major Henry Stanley sold four patents along the lines of those granted to his father, and one new patent of 150 acres, a total of 840 acres for the sum of \$ 5000.00. (Wayne Co, NC Deed Bk 12, p581) All of the land he purchased and the inherited land must have been disposed of in anticipation of moving. With that handsome sum available he could take advantage of buying opportunities in Georgia.
