Often the name "Anne" was given as "Nancy" and vice versa.

The grist mill--at one time Benjamin Saunders(father of Joseph Saunders/Sanders) owned 100a. on the SW side of the Narrows on Perquimans River and Cypress Swamp.(Deed Book B of N.C. #159. 1729). Benjamin d. 1744; Francis Saunders sought permission to erect a mill at Cypress Swamp in 1759. Joseph Sanders m. in 1748; d. after 1782. Joseph Sanders' son-in-law was Joseph Perisho. Joseph Perisho is reported to have operated a grist mill. Was it the one started by the earlier Sanders person?

THE NAME "PERISHO"

The French spelling of Perisho was mostly likely Perichaux or Perichot.

In the early N.C. records Perisho was spelled Perrishaw.

In Tyrrell Co. N.C. the name Perisho changed to Parisher. This took place in the early 1800's. The spelling was done by sound and whatever the clerk thought it might be that was what was put down on papers.

One of the stories handed down about the Perishos was that our early forefathers came from 30 km. south of Paris, France and they had a shop of some kind in a small village.

The name Parisher in Tyrrell County, N.C. has spread out from there to Raleigh, N.C., Houston, Tx. just to mention a few places.

There are quite a few Pariseau's in Quebec Ontario, and New Brunswick, and even here in the United States. (Pronounced Far ee so).

Are these some of our relation?

The following article concerns what happened at Mouleydier, which is in the southwest part of France, a bit inland from Bordeaux. It concerns a family named 'Andre Peyrichou'.

"This isn't a big miracle I am writing about. It is a rather small, but nice, miracle. Considering that the little French town had been burned to the ground and that its 93 families were starving. Before Mouleydier was burned, you would have found little to distinguish it from a thousand French towns. But Mouleydier had a pin stuck in it. The pin was on a war map in the Operations room at Gen. Eisenhower's headquarters (WW II). Mouleydier was on the fringe of an "alternate descent area" for air-borne troops in the invasion of France. Word was relayed through the Maquis, and the people of Mouleydier eagerly

prepared to do their part. Now they would do something more than give the Germans fishy stares, or serve them sour beer.

On the night of June 5, the eve of D Day, the villagers joined forces with the Maquis bands. They burst out of little Mouleydier and seized all the nearby bridges. They cut the roads and set up strong points. They surrounded German garrisons. They hacked down the tall posts of the glider traps. They entrenched themselves around the descent area, resolved to hold it so their liberators could make a safe landing.

On all of D Day they searched the sky. No gliders came. The villagers and the Maquis held their lines. Perhaps the gliders would come tomorrow, But day after day went by and the sky was empty. Three times the little army of Mouleydier in its faded blue smocks and corduroy pants, repelled German assaults. Until finally, after 15 days, they were flushed out of their trenches by an overwhelming German force.

Plans get changed. The Americans had decided against this air-borne drop. The Maquis fled through the woods to regroup. But the villagers of Mouleydier were left behind.

Angry Germans herded all the women into a big barn. They drove the men to a nearby village. Then Mouleydier was burned. This town would be held up as an example. Just as Lidice had been an example.

Next morning the women and children were let out of the big barn and they walked back into Mouleydier over the hot embers. A few chimneys stood, a few pieces of walls.

The next day packages came to the families of Grollier and Alary-Veyral and Annequit and Lachaize. And to more families the next day. And to more the next.

Mon Dieu! What did one make of this? No one had been told of packages. No one expected packages. And yet here were tuna fish, tinned meat, cocoa, honey, coffee, condensed milk, rice and candy and tinned butter.

More than 500 packages have come. They are still coming.(article written in 1946). Most of the families are getting one package a month.

Now the letters are coming back from Mouleydier. One of them says, "We expected nothing. All of a sudden, in our misery and our hunger we find food upon our doorstep. Then more food and more. It has saved us from sickness and starvation. It has given us hope."

The above article was sent to me by Charles O. Perisho (9th generation, paragraph number 793). He said that his father, Leland served in the War, in the Bordeaux area. Charles and his father corresponded with the Peyrichou family of Mouleydier, France. They sent pictures and other things and we sent candy and such.

The 'Maquis' were members of the French underground, fighting against the Nazis in World World II.

Perishos Were Early Quakers

Before going any farther I want to put in a word about the Quaker calendar as the early records in the various monthly meetings so read.

The Quaker calendar until 1752 assumed first month 25th (March 25) to be the first day of the new year. Thus 1st mo. 18, 1737 would be followed ten days later by 1st mo. 28, 1738; 11th mo was Jan; 12th month was Feb; 1st month was March, etc.

Double dates shown in some cases--here is how that came about--the 1751 edict of the British Parliament changed to Gregorian calendar. Now January would be first month instead of March. Many dates now become double dates as 1749/50.

The Quakers never accepted names of months as they were considered of pagan origin. "born ye 17th. 12 mo 1749 would be translated to Feb. 17, 1749(not Dec. 17th) and non-Quaker (translation as Feb. 17, 1750 O.S.(Old Style) or Feb. 17, 1749/50."

In Pasquotank Co.(Pasquotank later Symons Creek Monthly) from American Quaker Genealogy by Hinshaw we have entries from 1755 through 1832. Perishos concerned are in the third and fourth generations.

63. ISAAC (6) PERISHO (Joseph-5, Joseph-4, James-3, James-2, James-1), age 86 yr 10 mo and 11 da was instantly killed Monday afternoon (13 Mar 1905) by a Clover Leaf engine on bridge west of the city (Charleston, Il). Mr. Perisho who was crossing the bridge must not have heard the railroad steam engine coming down upon him. The engine hurled his body on the north side of the bridge, and strange to say the body was not badly mangled. Mr. Perisho was really nothing but a child. His mental condition had been a continuous source of worry to his family. At the inquest the evidence showed that Mr Perisho was walking on the trestle and as the engine rounded the curve the whistle was blown but the unfortunate man did not hear it. He had reached the west end of the bridge when the engine struck him, knocking him off the bridge where he rolled against a fence thirty feet away.

66. JOHN JENKINS (6) PERISHO (Joseph-5, Joseph-4, James-3, James-2, James-1), was a farmer all his life and acquired acreage to give each of his five children 160a, 8 miles west of Paris, Edgar Co., Illinois. One son, Joseph E. gave his son Calvin Edward when he married 90a and to his daughter Sara, when she married 81 $\frac{1}{2}$ a and the home place.

The following is a copy of the will of John J. Perisho:

I, John J. Perisho, of the county of Edgar and state of Illinois, being of sound mind and memory, but in feeble health, do make and declare this my last will and testament. 1st: I desire that all my just debts and funeral expenses be first paid.

2nd: I will and devise to my beloved wife, Barbara A. Perisho during the period of her natural life the home property in Paris (202 E. Wood St) where we now live, she to have the use, control suits and profits of the same as long as she shall live, also the the use possession and control of all our household and kitchen furniture, and horse and buggy and all fuel find and household supplies that may be on hands at the time of my death. I have arranged heretofore for certain sums of money to be paid to me and to my wife so long as she or I may live.

3rd. At the death of my wife I will and devise that my executors herein after named shall sell my dwelling house property in Paris, hereinfore devised to my wife for life and my horse and buggy and supplies of provisions and food on hand at public or private sale for cash or part cash as they may deem best, and make all necessary deeds of conveyance to pass a qrvd(quick claim ?) title to said premises. The proceeds of the sale of homestead after paying the expenses of such sale shall be divided as follows to wit the one half of the net proceeds of said sale shall be paid to my daughter, Susan Sheets, and out the other half of the sale of said home property, my executors shall pay the debts of myself and of my wife, and of each of them and the expenses of the administration of my estate, and the balance of said half so remaining, together with the proceeds of the sale of my horse and buggy and any supplies of food or provisions on hand, shall be divided equally between my five children, share and share alike. My executors hereinafter named shall after the death of my wife, divide the household and kitchen furniture up equally as may be between my five children as I do not want the household and kitchen furniture sold. I hereby appointed my sons, Joseph E. Perisho and William H. Perisho, executors of this my last will and testament and desire them to

faithfully carry out and execute the same. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this the 21st day of September A.D. 1899.
